## POW/MIA search goal: Answers

**A**MERICAN Veterans (DAV) believes they'll still be looking for answers for years to come, but he and Friday's other speaker, Wayne Stratos, also of DAV, offered some encouraging news.

One of those stories was of a pilot from a time fairly long ago, but from a place not that far.

Lt. Col. Addison Baker, from Akron, Ohio, flew a B-24 Liberator in a raid in 1943 on German oil re-

fineries in Romania, referred to as Hitler's Gas Station, when he was shot down.

His wife would be presented the Medal of Honor for his heroics, but buried in a U.S. military cemetery in Belgium in a grave marked "unknown," he didn't truly come home or receive a funeral until this year.

Since 2017, the Defense POW/MIA Accounting Agency

## PSP: Overnight fire kills several people

DELAWARE TOWNSHIP — Firefighters responded to a blaze shortly after midnight Friday in the 600 block of District Road that killed multiple people in the residence, according to Mercer-based Pennsylvania State Police.

In a statement Friday, PSP said a passing motorist called 911 to report that a residential structure was fully-engulfed at

that time.

First responders from Fredonia, Sheakleyville, Hempfield, Greenville, Transfer, Stoneboro, Sandy Lake, Jefferson and Jackson Center, plus LifeForce Ambulance, remained on the scene for several hours.


"Multiple fatalities were discovered at the residence, however no identifying information is being released at this time," state police said.





### Wall Street falls as FedEx warning adds to market woes

Wall Street closed out the stock market's worst week in three months with more losses Friday, as a stark warning from FedEx about rapidly worsening trends in the economy rattled already anxious investors.

The S&P 500 fell 0.7 percent, with all but two of its 11 company sectors ending in the red. The benchmark index sank 4.8 percent for the week, with much of the loss coming from a 4.3 percent rout on Tuesday following a surprisingly hot report on inflation. The last time it posted a bigger weekly decline was the week ended June 17.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 0.5 percent and the Nasdaq composite dropped 0.9 percent. The Russell 2000 index of smaller companies took the heaviest losses, falling 1.5 percent.

All the major indexes have now posted losses four out of the past five weeks.

FedEx sank 21.4 percent for its biggest single-day sell-off on record after warning investors that

### Ukrainian president: Burial site contains torture victims

IZIUM, Ukraine (AP) — Investigators searching through a mass burial site in Ukraine have found evidence that some of the dead were tortured, including bodies with broken limbs and ropes around their necks, Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy said Friday.

The site near the northeastern city of Izium, recently recaptured from Russian forces, appears to be one of the largest discovered in Ukraine.

Zelenskyy spoke in a video he rushed out just hours after the exhumations began, apparently to underscore the gravity of the discovery. He said more than 440 graves have been found at the site but that the number of victims was not yet known.

Digging in the rain, workers hauled body after body out of the sandy soil in a misty pine forest near Izium. Protected by head-to-toe suits and rubber gloves, they gently felt through the decomposing remains of the victims' clothing, seemingly looking for identifying items.

Associated Press journalists who visited the site saw graves marked with simple wooden crosses. Some of the

## West Virginia Gov. Jim Justice signs abortion ban into law

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (AP) — Republican Gov. Jim Justice on Friday signed into law a ban on abortions at all stages of pregnancy, making West Virginia the second state to enact a law prohibiting

the procedure since the U.S. Supreme Court's June ruling overturning its constitutional protection.

The bill will go into effect immediately, except for the criminal penalties, which will go into effect in 90 days, he said. Justice described the legislation on Twitter as "a bill that protects life."

"I said from the beginning that if WV legislators brought me a bill that protected life and included reasonable and logical exceptions, I would sign it, and that's what I did today," he said.

The ban has exemptions for medical emergencies and for rape and incest victims until eight weeks of pregnancy for adults and 14 weeks for those under the age of 18. Victims must report their assault to law enforcement 48 hours before the procedure.

Minors can report to the police or a doctor, who then must tell police.

The bill requires abortions to be performed by a physician at a hospital — a provision that at least two Republican lawmakers have said was intended to shut down abortions at the Women's Health Center, which has provided

ed the procedure since 1976 and was the state's sole abortion clinic. Providers who perform illegal abortions can face up to 10 years in prison.

Shortly after lawmakers passed the bill Tuesday, Women's Health Center of West Virginia Executive Director Katie Quinonez said the clinic's lawyer advised them to suspend abortions immediately.

Dozens of West Virginia women have already had to re-book canceled appointments at out-of-state clinics in places like Pennsylvania and Virginia, she said.

The Women's Health Center has been providing them with resources to book appointments out-of-state and funding to help cover travel and the procedure, Quinonez said.

After Justice announced he had signed the ban, the ACLU of West Virginia released a statement on Twitter calling the ban a "forced-birth bill" and saying the governor has "snubbed the vast majority of West Virginians and sided with extremists."

"This law is anything but pro-life. It places life-saving healthcare out of reach for tens of thousands," the tweet said. "Our work continues."

Indiana's abortion ban — signed by Republican Gov. Eric Holcomb in August — started being enforced Thursday.

He married his beloved wife, Roberta E. (Davis) Mills, on Nov. 20, 1958; she preceded him in death on March 31, 2015.


Tom enjoyed watching NASCAR, and above all else, loved his family.



A judge on Friday slashed nearly four years off the prison sentence of a star witness who pleaded guilty in the plot to kidnap Michigan's governor and helped federal prosecutors.

Ty Garbin's sentence of 6 1/4 years was reduced to 2 1/2 years, a reward even greater than prosecutors had sought.

U.S. District Judge Robert Jonker cited Garbin's "substantial assistance" to the government and his own assessment of the 26-year-old airplane mechanic, who cooperated soon



after his arrest, pleaded guilty and testified at two trials.

Prosecutors had requested a 36-month reduction while Garbin's attorneys asked for 51 months.

Jonker settled on a 45-month break.

Garbin has been in custody since he and five other men were arrested in October 2020. Even after his guilty plea, he's been locked up in local jails instead of the federal system in order to be nearby to assist authorities.

"This puts him in a really great position to transition to home detention or a halfway house pretty quickly," attorney Gary Springstead said of the

**Queen's death is reminder of disappearing WWII generation**

LONDON (AP) — The long goodbye for Queen Elizabeth II is a reminder of a broader truth playing out with little fanfare across Britain: The nation is bidding farewell to the men and women who fought the country's battles during World War II.

The queen, who served as a mechanic and truck driver in the last months of the war, was a tangible link to the sailors, soldiers, airmen, marines and others who signed up to do their bit in a war that killed 384,000 service personnel and 70,000 British civilians.

But like the queen, even the youngest veterans of the war are now nearing their 100th birthdays, and a steady stream of obituaries tells the story of a disappearing generation.

"It's extraordinary how that sense of the passing of time is felt very keenly at the moment," said Charles Byrne, director general of the Royal British Legion, the nation's largest armed services charity.

That loss is, perhaps, felt more widely in the United Kingdom than a country like the United States, because the U.K.'s very existence was threatened during the war. Bombs fell on cities from London to Belfast, women were conscripted into war work and wartime rationing didn't end until 1954.

Elizabeth, who famously saved ration coupons to make her wedding dress in 1947, led a ceremony of remembrance for all the nation's fallen service personnel each year on the anniversary of the end of World War I.

"She is the epitome of that sense of service and stoic contribution," Byrne said. "And that is treasured more than ever."

British authorities don't know exactly how many World War II veterans are left because the nation's census takers didn't track military service until last year. Those figures are due to

be released next month. But the number of survivors is dwindling.

It was a time of shared sacrifice. Then-Princess Elizabeth, like many teenagers, had to persuade her father to let her join the army in 1945.

When Elizabeth turned 18, King George VI exempted her from mandatory military service because he said her training as the heir to the throne took precedence over the wartime need for manpower.

But the princess, who began her war work at 14 with a broadcast to displaced children and later tended a vegetable garden as part of the government's "Dig for Victory" program, got her way.

She enlisted in the Auxiliary Territorial Service in February 1945 and trained to become a military truck driver and mechanic.

The ATS was the largest of the auxiliary services deploying women to non-combat roles such as clerks, drivers and dispatch riders to free up men for front line duties.

The first female member of the royal family to serve in the armed forces, Elizabeth was promoted to honorary junior commander, the equivalent of an army captain, after completing five months of training. But the war ended before she could be assigned to active duty.

On May 8, 1945, Princess Elizabeth appeared in uniform on the balcony of Buckingham Palace as the royal family greeted the crowds celebrating Germany's surrender.

**Former twp. secretary pleads guilty to embezzlement**

JACKSON TOWNSHIP — A former secretary for Jackson Township faces up to 20 years in prison and a fine of \$250,000 after pleading guilty this week to embezzling \$150,000 from the township.

According to U.S. Attorney Cindy K. Chung, Linda Baun, 73, pleaded guilty to one count of mail fraud Wednesday, changing her previous not guilty plea from December.

According to court records, between 2011 and 2019, Baun embezzled at least \$150,000 from the township by making unauthorized ATM withdrawals and charging personal items on Amazon to the township's debit card.

She has agreed to pay restitution in the amount of \$150,000.

Baun, who is currently a resident of Largo, Fla., is scheduled to be sentenced Jan. 5.

**Sarah Sanders undergoes surgery for thyroid cancer**

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (AP) — Former White House press secretary Sarah Sanders, who is running for governor in Arkansas, underwent surgery Friday for thyroid cancer.

Sanders announced she underwent the surgery after a biopsy earlier this month revealed that she had thyroid cancer.

Sanders was recovering at an Arkansas hospital on Friday, her campaign said.

"Today, I underwent a successful surgery to remove my thyroid and surrounding lymph nodes and by the grace of God I am now cancer-free," Sanders said in a statement released by her campaign. "I want to thank the Arkansas doctors and nurses for their world-class care, as well as my family and friends for their love, prayers, and support."

Sanders, 40, said she looked forward to returning to the campaign trail soon. Sanders' last public event was at the Arkansas Razorbacks football game on Saturday.

### God rest the Queen — and our weary world

We knew it was coming. Queen Elizabeth II was 96. Her obituary should not read, "Her Majesty died unexpectedly at Balmoral Castle." No, Elizabeth had a great run. That she inched toward 100 and was convergent, ambulatory and taking nourishment up to the end ought to salve the world's grief, if not her family's.

I've never given Elizabeth

Clearly, I was wrong

and ungenerous as

I'm no fan of a monarchy or any other institutional colossus that hoards wealth on a planet where continents of children wear not crowns, but distended bellies. And like normal human beings, my heart swells at genuine patriotism and pageantry. Can any nation beat the Brits at "Pomp and Circumstance?" At the same time, excess fanfare is falderal.

As it happens, though, my ambivalence toward kings, queens, princes, princesses, processions and tawdry palace intrigue overlooked a priceless quality possessed by the late Queen: Dignity. To my American ears, admittedly, the British accent in itself is edifying. Deportment is also vital, manners and restraint, too.

Queen Elizabeth had a public presence that was so refreshingly, well, dignified. Of course, those teeth shining with every smile chomped down behind closed

**My point is, in an era gone mad with contradictions, falsehoods, deceptions, dalliances, dismemberment and Faustian bargains, we can learn from Queen Elizabeth's way of addressing and interacting with her subjects — an unsavory but accurate term. Noblesse oblige is benevolent at its best.**

doors, where her offsprings' excesses were taken by the scruff. Buckingham Palace must have order. Charles, meanwhile, has conducted himself with authentic, if somewhat worn, stoicism in his hour of mourning. Has His Highness shamelessly used royal privilege to enrich himself? Indeed, but if we're going to sort out public figures on this basis, we best get busy on the threshing floor.

My point is, in an era gone mad with contradictions, falsehoods, deceptions, dalliances, dismemberment and Faustian bargains, we can learn from Queen Elizabeth's way of addressing and interacting with her subjects—an unsavory but accurate term. Noblesse oblige is benevolent at its best.

So, yes, I teared up listening to a young Elizabeth say to the Commonwealth, "I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."

My report would be lacking, however, if I didn't confess that my eyes are leaking over more than an elderly monarch's passing. I'm also world-weary, fatigued along with everyone else. The Rev. Barbara Brown Taylor experienced "compassion fatigue" as an Episcopal parish priest, which lead her to accept an endowed chair in religion at Piedmont College in 1997. A cel-

ebrated preacher still, she published a memoir, "Leaving Church," in 2006, describing at length how tiring it is to care deeply and intensely for parishioners (Thankfully, I'm not suffering in this way as a pastor).

Then there's "decision fatigue," a malady I stumbled upon over 10 years ago, long before COVID-19 put a strain on bandwidths one and all. The American Medical Association Web site now defines this weariness in terms that will surprise nobody: "A state of mental overload that can impede a person's ability to continue making decisions." The condition can especially hamper those in poverty, as they have to fret over every last cent, but I'll wager everybody has been deflated by choices that need to be made in times of stress.

And now we have "hope fatigue," so named by Brooklyn psychotherapist Leslie Alterman as the burden of anybody paying attention to the societal and medical landmines buried under today's every footfall. Among her patients, "There's an unspoken recognition that the chaos we are experiencing might be with us for a long time." For me, the chaos is conjured by those who engage in the impolite, cruel, brutal, deceitful, downright wicked behavior that scars our day. Attorney Joseph Welsh's 1954 question of renown to Senator Joseph McCarthy is laughably naïve in 2022: "Have you no sense of decency, sir? At long last, have you left no sense of decency?" Any response is sure to include an expletive.

Now I'm humming "God Save the Queen." For all of royalty's folly, Elizabeth Alexandra Mary Windsor knew how to behave herself — thereby sparing a world of already languishing innocent bystanders the ordeal of indecent nonsense. Neither Great Britain nor any other nation can spare her example. Now she is gone. Her repose is worth a few tears.

Mercer.

Wann and several employees officially cut the ribbon on the company's innovation center Friday.

Investing more than \$1.5 million into the former heater factory, Wann said Imperial Systems grew by more than 75,000 square feet, while it was looking at a possible 40,000 square foot expansion.

As the air filtration business grew beyond the Jefferson Township facility, Wann said moving into the former Reznor plant was advantageous, particularly with turnaround.

"With the short construction phase, we were able to move in while the construction was still going on," he said, moving production in to the facility within three months while construction was still ongoing. "It was a perfect timing, because it was an empty building."

"Our market is very large, and we have the ability to expand to be pretty big," he said.

Clients include GE, Amazon, Tesla, SpaceX and Ford Motor Company, as well as "mom and pop" businesses, like woodworkers.

Creating air filtration systems during the pandemic, Wann said, "We were an essential business, so we stayed open. We have a real good workforce here, and we were able to hire. People are hard workers in Mercer County; they got good blood. We are still doing what we have always done, which is air filtration, we are just doing it on a bigger scale."

While accepting applications for a variety of employees, Wann said he

would like to see the employee base at the new plant expand from the 25 now to 100 or so, with an overall growth to the business upwards of 200 people.

Commissioner Matt McConnell said seeing the business growing in Mercer County is indicative of good things that are happening in the area.

In first meeting Wann nearly two decades ago while housed in the shop in Jackson Center, McConnell said, "Knowing this gentleman, this

is just the start. I see a ton of growth and opportunity, and he is the right person, at the right time ... and that is going to be critical for not only Mercer borough, but Mercer County."

Wann said that while Imperial has expanded into the larger facility, he also anticipates growth at the Route 62 facility within the next three to five years.

"We hope to be able to create a lot of jobs here in Mercer and stay here for a long time," he said.

(DPAA) has been exhuming 88 graves marked as unknown in cemeteries in Belgium, and in April, DNA from Baker's family was used to identify him.

"This offers hope that many more will return home," Darceangelo said.

The DPAA's efforts extend back to World War II, but Stratos said with current technology, it's possible to identify the remains of soldiers from the Civil War.

"It's come a long way, and I hope it keeps going," Stratos said. "Closure for the families, that's what this is all about."

Darceangelo said the United States has been able to identify 100 servicemen this year, 77 from World War II, 21 from the Korean conflict and two from Vietnam.

Vietnam is considered the top priority, Stratos

**'The Phantom of the Opera' to close on Broadway next year**

**NEW YORK (AP)** — "The Phantom of the Opera" — Broadway's longest-running show — is scheduled to close in February 2023, the biggest victim yet of the post-pandemic softening in theater attendance in New York.

The musical — a fixture on Broadway since 1988, weathering recessions, war and cultural shifts — will play its final performance on Broadway on Feb. 18, a spokesman told The Associated Press on Friday.

The closing will come less than a month after its 35th anniversary.

It is a costly musical to sustain, with elaborate sets and costumes as well as a large cast and orchestra. Box office grosses have fluctuated since the show reopened after the pandemic — going as high as over \$1 million a week but also dropping to around \$850,000. Last week, it hit \$867,997 and producers may have seen the writing on the wall.

Based on a novel by Gaston Leroux, "Phantom" tells the story of a deformed composer who haunts the Paris Opera House and falls madly in love with an innocent young soprano, Christine. Andrew Lloyd Webber's lavish songs include "Masquerade," "Angel of Music," "All I Ask of You" and "The Music of the Night."

come by.

Brewing equipment is often fueled by natural gas, and prices for barley malt — or grain that has been allowed to germinate by moistening it — have more than doubled, to over 600 euros a ton. Glass bottles have risen by 80 percent, as glassmakers pay more for energy. Bottle caps are up 60 percent, and even glue for labels is in short supply.

"Prices for everything have changed significantly this year," said

Sebastian Utz, head technician at Munich's historic Hofbraeu Brewery, which traces its roots in the city to 1589. "To brew beer you need a lot of energy ... and for refrigeration. And at the same time, we need raw materials — barley malt, hops — where procurement has increased in price."

The costs of everything — cardboard, stainless steel for barrels, wood pallets, cleaning supplies to keep the brewing tanks spotless — have gone up.



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

No rush Browns' Garrett not eyeing sacks record, only Jets

BEREA, Ohio (AP) — Myles Garrett keeps a daily journal, dutifully jotting down notes on life, football and his many outside interests.

The Browns are about to write his name into their record book.



Garrett enters Sunday's game against the New York Jets needing just two sacks to surpass linebacker Clay Matthews as Cleveland's career leader. Matthews, who played 16 seasons for the Browns, was credited with 62 sacks, although he had 13 more before the NFL began recognizing them as an official stat in 1982.

The 26-year-old Garrett has a deep reverence for the game's history, but the All-Pro defensive end isn't making the record a priority.

He's focused elsewhere.

"What's important to me is winning," Garrett said Friday after emerging from a post-practice sauna session. "So whether I tie it or I don't or I break it, whatever it is. I want to be very impactful in the game. I want to be able to be a game changer for my team. But if I don't break the record, that's not going to sadden me."



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



driver gets hit by the eighth-generation Florida watermelon farmer, who has had a breakout first season with Trackhouse Racing. An anti-Chastain sentiment has developed and it wasn't helped last week when hard racing between Chastain, Harvick and Bubba Wallace caused Harvick to crash and lodge the first three-race DNF streak of Harvick's career.

NASCAR this season introduced a new spec Next Gen car that has equalized the competition, but Bristol was covered in dirt in the spring when the Cup Series made its first visit to the track. The race Satur-

day night is on the traditional concrete surface.

"I think Bristol has the most entertaining racing of any track we go to, period. I don't think there's a track better than this one, but I also think everyone's expectations are unrealistic of what things you can possibly get out of it," Logano added. "Whether it's dirt or concrete, it's been pretty intense lately and the ends of the races have ended in fireworks in a lot of them."

"So, I don't know why you would be expecting anything different than that."

NASCAR this week released its 2023 schedules to much feedback from its participants, particularly 2020 Cup champion Chase Elliott.

Elliott called for a more compact schedule, more night races, and argued against NASCAR continuing its season into November and going head-to-head with the NFL.

"I'm a firm believer that less is more in the sense of the timing of a schedule and when we could end our season to make the most for our TV ratings," Elliott said Friday. "I mean, 36 (races)? 45? 50? I don't think it matters how many races we have, but I don't see any reason to be competing against NFL football when that starts. In my opinion, that's not a battle we're ever going to win."



Should I say something about this to them? I had a nice time, but it would have been nicer if I felt like they might have accommodated me at least a little bit. — Visiting Family



West started with three rounds of hearts. To South, things looked impossible. He had three top losers, and surely one minor-suit finesse was wrong. However, he adopted a never-fall attitude. Mentally placing both minor-suit kings in East's hand, declarer carefully ruffed the third heart with his spade seven. He continued with the spade king; West led a fourth heart. Declarer ruffed high, cashed the spade queen and crossed to dummy by overtaking the carefully preserved spade two.

South still wasn't safe, but he avoided slipping from the high wire by calling for the club queen. When East didn't cover, South unblocked his jack. Now came the club 10. If East had covered, South would have won with the ace, played his last
